In the span of nine hours on Wednesday at the Mascoutah Invitational, Highland knocked off two previously unbeaten teams. The first victim was Mater Dei, No. 1 in the STLhighschoolsports small-schools rankings. Then, Highland came back a few hours later to beat Nashville 40-35 in



Shawn Rennegarbe with 59 seconds left.

"It was pretty intense, but I knew I had to take it," Isaak said.

Nashville (14-1) had one last chance to tie it in the final seconds, but Hempen grabbed the rebound and was fouled with :00.9 left. Her two free throws iced the game.

Hempen finished with a team-high 15 points, and Isaak added nine points. Both were named to the All-Tournament first team.

Back to back 3-pointers late in the first quarter by Sarah Trobaugh and Hempen gave Highland a 10-6 lead. The Bulldogs extended the lead to 25-14 in the third quarter before Nashville came back with a 19-8 run to tie it.

Jennifer Moeller scored a game-high 19 points for Nashville. Moeller was also named to the All-Tournament first team.

the tournament championship.

"I think the kids were fundamentally sound today, and they did a great job of executing our offense," Highland coach Matt Elledge said. "This is probably the best day of basketball we've had all season."

Nashville didn't make it easy, racing back from an 11-point second-half deficit to tie the game at 33-33 with 4:22 left in the fourth.

But 19 seconds later, Katie Hempen completed a traditional 3-point play to give the lead back to Highland (13-2).

"I didn't know the game was tied, to tell you the truth," Hempen said. "We were just playing our game. We worked hard against Mater Dei, but why work hard just to lose in the championship game? We wanted it."

Hempen found Trina Isaak for a basket on Highland's next possession to make it 38-33. Nashville cut it to 38-35 and had the ball with a minute left when Isaak drew a charging call on

"The girls did a great job fighting back against a quality team in Highland," Nashville coach Wayne Harre said. "We just made several mistakes at the end of the game, and we've got to get better."

Highland, No. 9 among area large schools, has won five consecutive games and nine of its last 10. It is the second Mascoutah Invitational title for the Bulldogs, who last won it in 2006.

In other games Wednesday:

**Mater Dei 57, Belleville West 29** • It wasn't for the championship as he had expected, but Mater Dei coach Dave Kohnen had no doubt the Knights would be ready for the third-place game.

And it was their opponent, Belleville West, that paid the price.

Mater Dei, bouncing back from a semifinal loss to Highland earlier in the day, took a 33-12 halftime lead and coasted to a 57-29 win over the Maroons.

"I had never had any doubt because this team has a lot of character," Kohnen said. "When you play hard, good things happen."

Kohnen blamed himself for the loss to Highland.

"We were sluggish, and we were never in sync on both ends of the floor," he said. "I don't think I prepared them well enough."

Brooke Schulte had 14 points against West. Ashley Rakers added 13 as the Knights improved to 13-1. Erika McCaster had 10 points for West, all in the second half.

**Highland 55, Mater Dei 46** • A superb defensive effort and a solid inside game lifted the Bulldogs (12-2) to a semifinal win over the defending champion Knights, who dropped to 13-1.

Mater Dei led 15-11 after one quarter, but a 9-0 Highland run, capped by Trina Isaak's 3-pointer, gave the Bulldogs a 20-15 lead with 2:59 remaining in the second quarter.

The score was tied at 22-22 at halftime, but a layup by Isaak, off a pass from Emily Michael, put Highland ahead 45-38 with 3:46 to play in the fourth quarter. Mater Dei never got closer than five points the rest of the game.

Isaak led Highland with 14 points while Katie Hempen and Michael added 13 and 12 points, respectively. The Bulldogs scored most of their points in the second half on layups.


"They really took us out of our offense the last time we played them, but today the girls did a nice job of setting some screens and working the ball inside," said Highland coach Matt Elledge. "Mater Dei didn't have a good shooting day and that also helped us."

Brooke Schulte led Mater Dei with 15 points while Ashley Rakers scored 13.

**Nashville 51, Belleville West 32** • The Hornettes (14-0) took a 13-6 first-quarter lead and led by 10 at halftime and 15 after three quarters en route to an impressive semifinal win. Senior Jennifer Moeller led Nashville with 18 points, breaking the 1,000-point mark for her career, while Melanie Rhine added 11 points.

"We did a good job of being patient on offense and the credit for that goes to the five girls who are on the

floor at any given time," said Nashville coach Wayne Harre, whose team advanced to Wednesday night's championship game against Highland.

West's Erika McCaster, who had 61 points in her first two tournament games, was held to 12 points.

"Jenna Morris did a good job of chasing her and when she drove inside, we got good help," Harre said. "I was worried about that because McCaster is capable of beating you by herself."

"We didn't shoot well, but that was because of their defense," said West coach Clayton Fisher. "Nashville plays a style we haven't seen much so far. Edwardsville is kind of similar in terms of playing physical."

**O'Fallon 40, Carbondale 37** • O'Fallon bounced back from a first-round overtime loss to Freeburg to win three straight games and earn the consolation championship. It was the second consecutive consolation title at Mascoutah for O'Fallon, which improved to 8-5.

"I'll take 3-1 here because this tournament is loaded with talent," said Panthers coach Ryan Massey. "I'd just like to win that first one and get on the winners' side of the bracket."

The Panthers led 19-8 at halftime but trailed 32-27 early in the fourth quarter before a 10-0 run, capped by a basket by Taylor Klingelhoef, put them ahead 37-32 with 1:35 remaining.

"The third quarter we came out and they just outplayed us," Massey said. "I was disappointed with our effort in that quarter, but more important, we had some poise down the stretch and made some shots when we needed to."

Katie Roustio, O'Fallon's 6-2 sophomore center, missed the game with a sprained ankle. In her absence, Klingelhoef had a game-high 19 points.

Sarah Goodale led Carbondale with 13 points.

**Breese Central 66, Althoff 31** • Senior Shelby Kohrmann had 29 points, including seven 3-pointers, as Central picked up a surprisingly easy victory in the fifth-place game. The Cougars led 33-15 at halftime and 53-25 after three quarters.

"I was really proud of the way the team responded after a tough loss last night (to Highland in the quarterfinals)," said Central coach Nathan Rueter. "It was a game where we definitely looked like we had a plan offensively and we executed it well."

Taylor Voss added 12 points for the Cougars, who improved to 13-3. Jazmine Stubblefield led Althoff with 13 points.

"I told the girls in the locker room 'go home and don't think about basketball.' It's my job as a head coach to figure out how to fix this," said Althoff coach Lori Crunk. "I told them to enjoy their three days off and we'll come back to practice and start over in the new year."

Althoff senior Janel Whitworth missed her second straight game with a left knee injury. She will have an MRI Thursday and it's uncertain when she will be able to play.

**Breese Central 52, Freeburg 29** • Jena Hemann scored 14 points and Shelby Kohrmann added 13 as Central rolled to a lopsided win in a fifth-place semifinal. Caitlin Busch led Freeburg with eight points.

**Althoff 51, Mascoutah 46** • The Crusaders got 11 points from Jazmine Stubblefield and 10 from Amarah Brooks-Williams as they advanced to face Breese Central in the fifth-place game. Danielle Amann-Stewart led Mascoutah with 16 points while Jessica Scinto added 12.

## PREVIOUS TOURNAMENT COVERAGE

**MASCOUTAH** • The Belleville West girls beat city rival Althoff for the second time in 10 days, and the rematch was even more enjoyable for coach Clayton Fisher.

The Maroons, who defeated the Crusaders 67-57 on Dec. 18 at West, defeated Althoff 56-42 Tuesday night in the quarterfinals of the Mascoutah Invitational. West (9-4) advances to a semifinal game against Nashville at 1 p.m. Wednesday.

"We fouled too much, but as far as positioning and executing a game plan, that was our best defensive effort of the year," Fisher said. "The girls played fairly smart defense and that was the key."

West led 23-18 at halftime and expanded its lead to 42-28 on a layup by senior Erika McCaster with 32 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

"The first thing (Fisher) said when he came into the locker room at halftime is '18 points is good.' He said to keep it up in the second half and we did," McCaster said. "We're going to celebrate because this is a pretty big win for us."

McCaster scored 21 of her game-high 28 points in the second half.

"The first half I was just going fast and I wasn't playing my game, so I went into the locker room and went by myself in the corner and told myself I had to pick it up for us to win," McCaster said.

"We ran a lot of sets in the second half to isolate Erika where she could use her quickness," Fisher said.

"She made a couple nice passes and hit a couple huge threes. She got frustrated in the first half and that's a credit to (Jazmine) Stubblefield and her defense."

The loss dropped Althoff to 7-5. Crusaders senior Janel Whitworth injured her left knee in the second quarter and didn't return.

"(The training staff) thinks it's just pinched, so that's good news," said Althoff coach Lori Crunk. "You could see her ankle braces give and then I saw her knee go and I'm like 'Oh, my gosh.' She'll be re-evaluated (Wednesday), but right now we're thankful that it doesn't seem to be anything worse."

West held 6-1 Crusaders center Amarah Brooks-Williams to a season-low six points.

"Sami Voegtler did an incredible job on Amarah," Fisher said. "You look at the two and obviously Sami is not as big, but she's a strong girl too. She put herself in the right spot all game."

"They had someone in front and someone behind and that's exactly what I would have done," Crunk said.

"We were having a hard time even getting it over to her side. That's something to work on for the second half (of the season)."

On the other end of the floor, Althoff simply had no answer for McCaster, especially in the second half.

"I can visualize several times where she went three of our girls like they were in cement and never moved and she would get the layup," Crunk said.

Alece Shumpert had 18 points to lead the Crusaders. Voegtle added 10 points for West.

In other games Tuesday:

**Nashville 32, Mascoutah 15** • The Hornettes never allowed the host Indians more than five points in any quarter as they advanced to the semifinals. Melanie Rhine led Nashville with 15 points.

"They slowed the pace down, which is fine," said Hornettes coach Wayne Harre. "You grind it out and you've got to make sure you keep your focus defensively. We try to contest every shot."

**Highland 58, Breese Central 51** • A 3-point play by Kayla Martin gave Highland (11-2) a 49-44 lead with 4:14 remaining in the fourth quarter. Central twice got within two points, but a pair of free throws by Katie Hempen put the Bulldogs ahead 56-51 with 13 seconds to play.

Hempen (18 points) and Martin (14) were the leading scorers for Highland, which will play Mater Dei in a semifinal game at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday.

"It was a physical game and it's going to come down to free throws and Katie and Kayla hit some down the stretch," said Bulldogs coach Matt Elledge. "The girls did what they needed to do to get to the basket and get some points."

Shelby Kohrmann had 17 points for Central, which will face Freeburg in a fifth-place semifinal at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday. April Gebke added 11 points and Jena Hemann had 10.

"We showed a lot of heart, but we weren't strong enough with the basketball," said Cougars coach Nathan Rueter. "We came out of the locker room timid and obviously way under aggressive for the style of play that was out there tonight. They scored 18 points in the first quarter and until my kids picked it up, they were in total control of thame."

**Mater Dei 67, Freeburg 37** • In the first quarterfinal of the championship bracket, a layup by Kayla Eversgerd capped an 18-2 run by the Lady Knights and gave them a 26-9 lead with 4:06 remaining in the second quarter. Mater Dei (13-0) never trailed by less than 16 points the rest of the game.

Alexa Becker led the defending champions with 18 points. Kaley Boeckmann and Brooke Schulte added 15 and 12 points, respectively.

"I think we're picking up on our defense and it's starting to show," said Mater Dei coach Dave Kohnen. "We moved the ball pretty good and ran the break very well."

"Our biggest asset is our balance. Anybody can strike at any time."

Kelsey Robertson led Freeburg with nine points.

"If you lose and play well, you can still get a positive out of it," said Midgets coach Fred Blumberg. "We didn't play very well, but part of that is Mater Dei's size and athletic ability. They're just so big and quick and they get the ball down the floor so fast and they guard you so well."

**O'Fallon 53, Mount Vernon 34** • In a consolation quarterfinal, the Panthers bounced back from a first-round overtime loss to Freeburg by taking a 21-12 halftime lead and expanding it to 37-19 after three

quarters. Taylor Underwood scored 10 of her team-high 14 points in the fourth quarter while Kendall Butler had 10 points.

Jessica Green led Mount Vernon with 16 points; Haley Lockhart added 10.

**Centralia 64, Belleville East 44** • The Annies outscored the Lancers 18-6 in the third quarter en route to a win in the consolation quarterfinals. Hannah Shores led Centralia with 25 points while Ashton Doza (14) and Khadija Brown-Haywood (11) were also in double figures.

Junior Mariah Sunkett led Belleville East with 16 points.

**Okawville 48, Riverview Gardens 44** • Okawville, which had a 22-9 lead after one quarter, endured a scoreless second quarter and trailed 36-34 after three quarters before rallying to earn the victory in a consolation quarterfinal. Sophomore Megan Wienstroer led the Lady Rockets with 14 points.

Monique Rigsby and Rakilah Taylor had 11 points apiece for Riverview Gardens while Jasmine Ball added 10 points.

**Carbondale 62, Carlyle 59** • The Terriers, who led 19-8 after one quarter before falling behind 54-45 early in the fourth quarter, rallied in the final minute to pick up the win. Elaina Robinson had 22 points for Carbondale while McKena Miller and Zamorrow Glispie added 16 and 10 points, respectively.

Sophomore Paige Rakers had a game-high 23 points for Carlyle. Bobby Harris added 12 points.

**O'Fallon 57, Centralia 52**: Kendall Butler (16 points) was one of three players in double figures for O'Fallon, which advanced to Wednesday's 2:30 p.m. consolation championship game against Carbondale. Taylor Klingelhofer and Taylor Underwood added 12 and 10 points, respectively, for the Panthers.

Ashton Doza (16 points) and Hannah Shores (12) were the top scorers for Centralia.

**Carbondale 44, Okawville 36** • Sarah Goodale had a team-high 16 points to help as Carbondale won a consolation semifinal. Alysssa Brammeier had 16 points for Okawville while Megan Wienstroer added 12.

#### **PREVIOUS TOURNAMENT COVERAGE**

A little change of pace made a big difference for the Mascoutah girls Monday night.

The host Indians, who trailed 13-12 after one quarter, held Carbondale to 11 points in the second half en route to a 42-30 victory in the first round of the Mascoutah Invitational.

Mascoutah (8-2) advances to the quarterfinals, where it will face Nashville at 7 p.m. Tuesday.

"The tempo of the game changed after the first quarter," said Indians coach Terry Moeller. "They were flying up and down the court and we had to stop that.

"We stopped pressing and tried to work on the half-court defense. Once we did that, their shot was selection wasn't as good."

The score was tied at 19-19 at halftime, but a 10-2 Mascoutah run, capped by a bank shot from Sierra McCoy, made the score 31-21 with 2:18 remaining in the third quarter. Carbondale never got closer than six

points the rest of the game.

"Jasmine (Harris) had a couple buckets and we had a spell where we stuck the ball inside and Danielle (Amann-Stewart) had some nice shots underneath," Moeller said.

Amann-Stewart, a 5-9 senior, had a game-high 20 points while Harris added 13.

"Danielle is very strong inside and she posts up very well," Moeller said. "She really had to work hard because it was very physical tonight."

"Before the second half, we talked in the locker room and we knew this could be our game," Amann-Stewart said. "We had to step up and get the ball inside and get more physical."

"Part of our game is pushing the ball up the floor and getting in transition. When we do that, we really work together and get the ball inside."

Sarah Goodale had nine points for Carbondale, which will play Carlyle in a quarterfinal game at 1 p.m. Tuesday.

**NASHVILLE 61, CARLYLYE 27** • The Hornettes, who led by five (22-17) at halftime, outscored Carlyle 18-5 in the third quarter. Melanie Rhine led a balanced Nashville offense with 12 points while Breanna Pelker added 10 points.

Cati Funderburk had 11 points for Carlyle, which didn't score a field goal in the second half.

**MATER DEI 81, MOUNT VERNON 27** • The defending champion Knights (11-0) took a 44-11 halftime lead and cruised to an easy win in the opening game of the tournament. Ashley Rakers and Kaley Boeckmann scored 19 and 13 points, respectively, while Mallory Mensing and Brooke Schulte added 12 points apiece. Cheyenne Piper had 11 points for Mount Vernon.

**FREEBURG 52, O'FALLON 50 (OT)** • Freeburg, which led 11-5 after one quarter but trailed 37-32 after three quarters, came back to beat the Panthers in overtime. Danielle Wilson (17 points) and Taylor Poindexter (14) were the leading scorers for the Midgets (5-5), who will face Mater Dei in a quarterfinal game at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday.

"I don't think we're going to blow O'Fallon away, but we were hoping if we could stay in the ballgame, we had a good shot," said Freeburg coach Fred Blumberg. "We led big early, but a team like O'Fallon is going to come back."

"The size difference hurt us quite a bit, but we got some good bounces and boxed out at some key times and won it at the end."

Katie Roustio, a 6-2 sophomore, led O'Fallon (5-5) with 16 points before fouling out in overtime while Kaitlin Kendall added 10. The Panthers will face Mount Vernon in a consolation quarterfinal at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday.

"I thought we played pretty hard, but what killed us was lackadaisical passing in the second half off of rebounds," said O'Fallon coach Ryan Massey. "Four times we got defensive rebounds and threw it away. Late in the game, with Roustio out, we couldn't get a rebound."

**HIGHLAND 53, CENTRALIA 36** • Trailing 11-8 after the first quarter, the Bulldogs (10-2) outscored the Annies 26-13 over the next two quarters. Trina Isaak (13 points) and Katie Hempen (12) were the leading scorers for Highland, which advanced to Tuesday's 4 p.m. quarterfinal against Breese Central.

Ashton Doza had a team-high nine points for Centralia.

**BREESE CENTRAL 51, BELLEVILLE EAST 50** • Jena Hemann sank two free throws with 7.6 seconds remaining to lift the Cougars (10-2) over the Lancers. Shelby Kohrmann led Central with 14 points while April Gebke had 13 and Hemann had 11.

Junior Mariah Sunkett had 16 points and 15 rebounds for East while Alexis Brown had 13 points. East (5-6) will play Centralia in a consolation semifinal at 10 a.m. Tuesday.

**ALTHOFF 61, RIVERVIEW GARDENS 35** • The Crusaders, who lost in overtime to Mater Dei in the 2009 championship game, got 27 points from 6-1 senior Amarah Brooks-Williams. Jazmine Stubblefield added 12 points for Althoff (7-3), which will face city rival Belleville West in a quarterfinal game at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday. Jasmine Ball led Riverview Gardens with nine points.

**BELLEVILLE WEST 65, OKAWVILLE 56** • Senior Erika McCaster, who recently became West's all-time leading scorer, had another huge game with 33 points. Samantha Voegtle and Emily Becker had 13 and 10 points, respectively, for the Maroons, who improved to 8-4.

Sophomore Megan Wienstroer had 26 points for Okawville, which will face Riverview Gardens in a consolation quarterfinal at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday.

"Okawville is a fine team," said West coach Clayton Fisher. "I think we're a little better, but give them all the credit in the world. "Our scouting report, believe it or not, did say 'don't leave No. 35 (Wienstroer) open' but sometimes it doesn't get from my mouth to the chalkboard to their brains in the most efficient manner.

"Offensively, when we're clicking, we're tough. Defensively, we struggle and we're not very strong physically. But it's no secret Erika was by far the quickest girl on the floor, so every loose ball, she had her hands on it."
